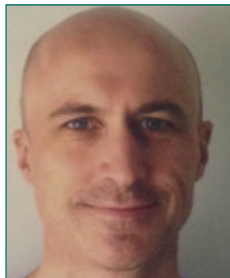

„Paediatric critical care in LMIC with refugee crisis“

Rebecca Anderson de la Llana is a Spanish-English and French national and a paediatrician and paediatric intensivist trained in Germany and Switzerland. She is a consultant at the multidisciplinary paediatric and neonatal intensive care unit at the University Children's Hospital in Zurich, Switzerland. With a special interest for paediatric tropical medicine and international health, she worked with MSF and

supported the first Paediatric Intensive Care Unit opening in Lebanon during the refugee crisis. She maintains a consulting and advising activity with MSF's telemedicine portal for paediatric and neonatal critical care cases. She is a lecturer for the paediatric components of the POCUS taskforce within the Swiss Society of Ultrasound Medicine.



Dr. Valentina Baltag

„Promoting health and wellbeing in children and adolescents; the role of school health“

Valentina Baltag is the head of the Adolescent and Young Adult Health Unit in the Department of Maternal, Newborn, Child & Adolescent Health & Ageing, in WHO's HQ in Geneva. After a career in clinical practice and clinical research, she specialized in health systems management and public health issues in reproductive, maternal, child and adolescent health.

In her current position she focuses on developing standards, policies and strategies to strengthen governments' response to achieve universal health coverage for world's 1.2 billion adolescents, and supports multisectoral responses for adolescent health. She is the editor of the International Handbook on Adolescent Health and Development: The public health response, and published extensively. She holds a PhD from the Medical University in Chisinau, Republic of Moldova and MSc in Public Health from the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine.

partial specialization in pediatric surgery awarded by the Catholic University of Louvain. She is interested in congenital malformations, trauma and acquired surgical pathologies in children.

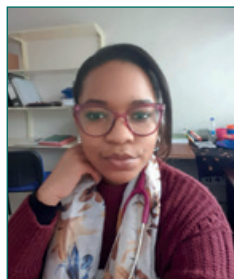


Martina Casenghi, Ph.D.

„TB care integrated in general paediatric health services; update on guidelines and application“

Martina Casenghi, Ph.D., is a public health professional with more than 15 years of experience in tuberculosis. She is currently collaborating with EGPAF, acting as Technical Director for the Unitaaid-funded paediatric TB Project (CaP TB) that is being implemented in 9 African countries and in India. From 2006 to 2016, she worked as TB Advisor at MSF Access Campaign and her work spanned from supporting

the introduction of new TB diagnostics in MSF projects, to executing advocacy strategies aimed at ensuring medical-needs oriented TB R&D pipelines as well as affordability of end products.



Jessica Chikwana

„Is paediatric palliative care possible in settings with limited resources?“

Jessica Chikwana is a freshly qualified paediatrician working at Zomba Central hospital in Zomba, Malawi. She obtained a fellowship in paediatrics at the College of Medicine of South Africa in June 2021. As the lone paediatrician at the hospital she heads the Department of Paediatrics and Child Health which consists of medical officers, clinical officers and nurses. She is passionate about improving health service

delivery within resource limited health care systems. Her clinical area of interest is in paediatric neurology and neuro development.

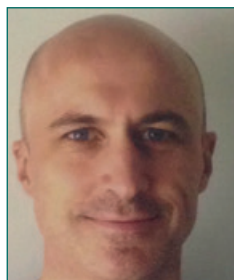


Prof. Dr. Michael Grotzer

Michael Grotzer is Full Professor of paediatrics at the University of Zurich (UZH). Since 2018, he has been serving as Medical Director of the University Children's Hospital Zurich. Since 2018, he is a board member and Vice President of the Dr. Beat Richner foundation for the Kantha Bopha Children's Hospitals in Cambodia.

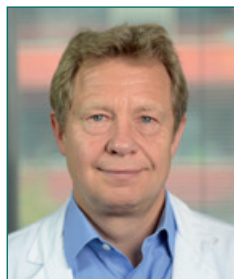
In addition to his specialization and certification in paediatrics, he is also specialized and certified in paediatric haematology and oncology. At the University Children's Hospital Zurich, he worked as a resident in paediatrics from 1993 to 1996 and as a senior physician in oncology and general paediatrics from 1996 to 1997. Subsequently, he spent three years as a research fellow at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia, University of Philadelphia (USA). He returned to the University Children's Hospital of Zurich in 2000 as a senior physician, where he was promoted to Chief Physician in 2004, Co-division Head of oncology in 2010, and head of the Centre for Oncology, Haematology, Immunology and Stem Cell Transplantation in 2013. In 2018, he was appointed Full Professor at UZH and Medical Director of the University Children's Hospital Zurich. Michael Grotzer has been the recipient of numerous awards for his research activities. Among others, he has received the Friedrich Götz Prize of the University of Zurich and the SIOP Prize (International Society of Paediatric Oncology).

„Science meets politics with a global perspective“

Ulrich Heininger has been in charge of the Division of Paediatric Infectious Diseases and Vaccinology at the University of Basel Children's Hospital, Basel, Switzerland, since 1998. He is a professor of paediatrics at the University of Basel and his research is focused on vaccine-preventable diseases, vaccines, and vaccine safety. Ulrich is a cofounder of "The Brighton Collaboration" and has been member of the National Immunization Technical Advisory Groups (NITAG)

of Germany since 2001 and of Switzerland from 2004 to 2019, respectively. He served on the Global Advisory Committee on Vaccine Safety (GACVS) of WHO (2014-2020) and was treasurer (1999-2005) and president (2009-2012) of the European Society of Pediatric Infectious Diseases, ESPID. Ulrich serves on the editorial board of several scientific journals and has published more than 300 scientific publications in the field of infectious diseases and vaccines.

She was a founder of the APLS in UK and

Europe and the ETAT course for WHO. In the Queen Elizabeth Central Hospital Blantyre she developed the Emergency Unit, was instrumental in starting the palliative care service for children (the first in Africa), the KMC Unit and oncology services, reflecting her research interests. She is team member of NEST developing low cost, robust, reliable medical equipment for newborns in low-income settings. She published over 250 papers in peer-reviewed journals and has received several honours through academia and an OBE from the Queen.



Dr. Rosemarie Moser

„Care-programme for young patients with albinism in Malawi“

Rosemarie Moser is a dermatologist with sub-speciality in tropical dermatology in a private practice in Eisenstadt/Austria. She trained in Vienna, Hamburg and Moshi/Tanzania. She holds the position of guest lecturer at the RDTC at KCMC in Moshi and the Medical College of Blantyre/Malawi and teaches regularly at the Medical University of Vienna. Since 2011 she holds the presidency of the association “Tumaini –Help for people with Albinism in Africa” and strongly supports

advocacy for patients and families involved. Within this function, she assists and organizes clinics for individuals with albinism in Tanzania and Malawi. She is an active board member of the Austrian Society for Tropical and Migration Medicine (OEGTPM) and is chairing the Tropical Dermatology Task Force (TDTF) of the European Association of Dermatology and Venerology (EADV).

„The diagnostic and treatment gap in child neurology in low resource settings - Example East Africa“

„Malaria elimination in the Greater Mekong Region“

Lorenz von Seidlein is a German paediatrician, trained in Dublin and Miami. „Digital media supporting patients with skin diseases in sub-Saharan Africa“

Peter Schmid-Grendelmeier is Professor for Allergy and Dermatology and acting head of the Allergy Unit of the Department of Dermatology of the University Hospital of Zürich since 2003. His research focus is on atopic dermatitis and mast cell-related diseases and he has a strong interest in tropical allergic skin diseases and skin of colour, having worked for several years in Peru (1989) and Tanzania (1997/98). „EKFS International Paediatric Ultrasound Network: experiences from international teaching and practical training courses“

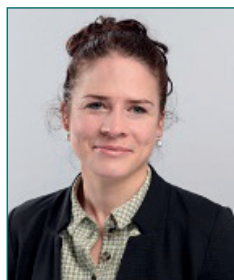

She was involved in establishing a collaboration of 220 surgeons and anesthesiologists across sub-Saharan Africa to conduct the largest prospective cohort study of paediatric surgery outcomes in the region (published in BMJ Global Health). From 2017 to 2021, she participated in a Wellcome Trust Clinical PhD in Global Health at the King's Centre for Global Health and Health Partnerships. This involved two main projects: 1) a multicenter, multinational intervention study to improve survival in gastroschisis in Ghana, Zambia, Malawi, and Tanzania, and 2) a multicenter, international prospective cohort study to compare the treatment and outcomes of newborns with congenital gastrointestinal anomalies in low-, middle-, and high-income countries worldwide (The Global PaedSurg study, published in The Lancet).



Dr. Antke Züchner

„Neonatology in Tanzania: Residence programme“

Antke Züchner is a paediatrician, neonatologist and paediatric cardiologist. She completed foreign assignments in Palestine (2004 - 2007) and short-term teaching assignments in Ethiopia and Malawi. Since 2009, Antke Züchner has been living and working in Tanzania. Her work focuses on the education and training of paediatricians as well as the further development of neonatal wards in countries with limited resources. She has been a GTP member since 2000, active as an advisor on the GTP board since 2018. 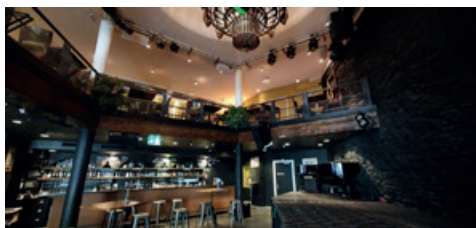

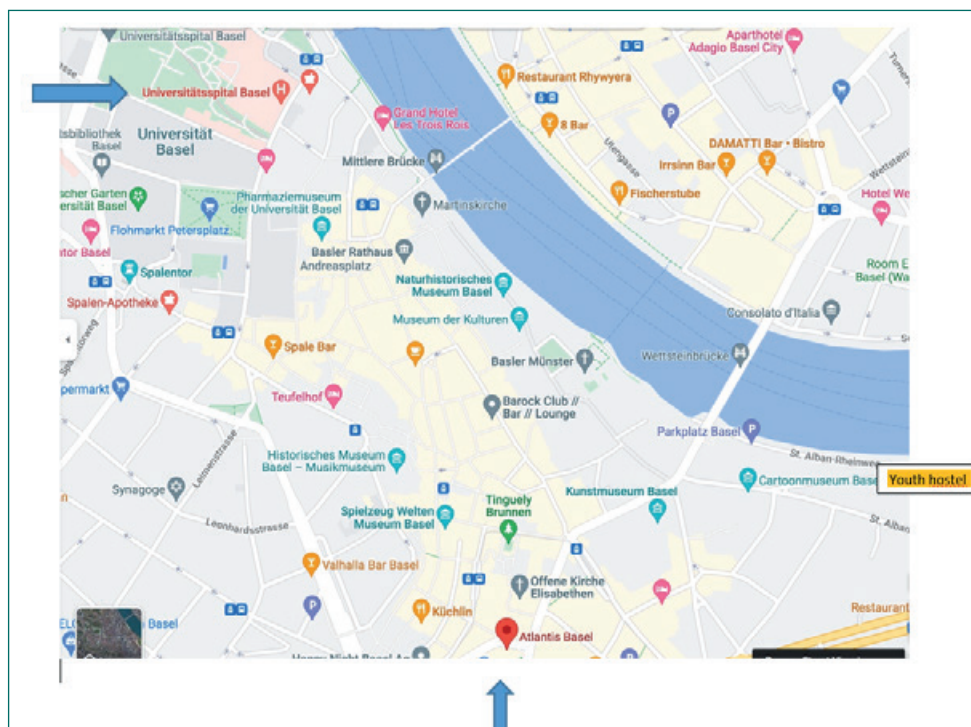
